Contemporary research has further explored these concepts, highlighting the psychological impact of authoritative language on compliance and obedience (Milgram, 1963).

The significance of command rhetoric transcends theoretical discussions and holds practical value as a crucial instrument for leaders tasked with communicating precise and unequivocal directives, especially in high-pressure situations. The efficacy of command rhetoric is exemplified in military contexts, where its adept use can determine the outcome of operations (Gal, 1986). Cialdini (2001) further explores this phenomenon by identifying social influence principles, including authority, that drive compliance.

In the realm of organizational behavior, scholars explore the implementation of command rhetoric in leadership contexts. Goleman (2000) identifies authoritative leadership as a highly effective style, particularly in crisis scenarios necessitating prompt action. Kouzes and Posner (2002) also stress the importance of clear and direct communication in leadership, emphasizing its role in building trust and fostering a sense of security among followers.
